# **Inspector of Schools**

Magbenteh Community Boarding School reopened for the second term of the 2017/2018 academic year on 8th January 2018. The Inspector of Schools from the Ministry of Education visited and reported afterwards that we were top out of 160 schools in the area for student and staff attendance.



# **Therapeutic Feeding Centre**



Malnutrition rates in Sierra Leone among some of the highest in the world. According to the World Health Organisation, 45% of child deaths are related to malnutrition.

Magbenteh Community Hospital established a Stabilization Centre in 2012 which served the communities of Bombali District until the Ebola epidemic in 2014 which currently remains closed, until funding is secured. Thanks to the donations of cooking items and special nutrition food for malnourishment offered by the district nutritionist, we are now able to plan for a closer reopening.

### **Female Ward**



The Female Ward at Magbenteh Community Hospital is in urgent need of refurbishment with a recent collapse of the cylotex ceiling as a result of termites.

Due to this incident we have to temporarily relocate current patients, for safety and hygiene reasons.

### **Arms around Sierra Leone**

Height additional upper-limb amputee patients were measured and cast for their prosthetics at the Regional Hospital Physiotherapy Department, funded by Arms Around Sierra Leone. The aim of the project is to improve the quality of life of all those who have become amputees for different reasons.



In the coming weeks the patients will return to the Regional Hospital for the fitting of their new prosthetics. Following this, they will receive physiotherapy at Magbenteh Community Hospital as part of the rehabilitation process.

### Helfende Hände



The Swiss-Sierra Leone Development Foundation recently welcomed friends from the German organisation, Helfende Hände.

During their time in Makeni, a ceremony was held for the handing over of three new classrooms funded by Helfende Hände, with the support of SSLDF. It was a wonderful occasion with speeches from the Head Boy and Head Girl, alongside a representative from the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology. Before leaving, Helfende Hände presented a very generous donation to SSLDF for drugs and medical supplies at Magbenteh Community Hospital. We are extremely grateful for the long-standing support and commitment of Helfende Hände to SSLDF's work.

#### Increase in Child Malnutrition

Since the beginning of March, the Under-Fives clinic at Magbenteh Community Hospital has received 4 cases of acute and chronic malnutrition.

One of these admissions includes a 4-year-old boy called Hassan weighing just 6kg. His parents passed away 2 years ago, leaving his grandmother to care for him and his 4 siblings. Hassan was tested positive for both HIV and TB. Unable to walk alone, suffering from severe anemia, he was in a critical condition.



The nurses were able to provide Hassan with milk for 6 days (inserted through a tube as he was unable to eat for himself). He then received plumpy nut (food specially adapted to treat malnutrition) for 4 days. On day 9 Hassan started asking his grandmother for rice, which was a good sign.

The rise of malnourished children arriving Magbenteh Community Hospital over the past few weeks is extremely worrying, especially in regards to the side effects of malaria and anemia. There is an evident need to reopen the centre officially as soon as possible, but funding must be secured first to purchase food supplements and drugs.

#### **Malaria Endemic**

One of our medical team's biggest challenges is the fight against Sierra Leone's most common infectious disease and one of its most serious public health problems: malaria. According to the World Malaria Report, the disease is endemic in Africa and referred to as 'the sickness of poverty', despite being both treatable and preventable. Children under the age of 5 are particularly susceptible to infection, commonly developing severe anaemia, respiratory distress or cerebral malaria.



Magbenteh Community Hospital receives an average of 8,000 child in and out patients per year.

Of this figure, 45% are diagnosed with malaria. There is a distinct relationship between poverty and malaria. The communities which Magbenteh Community Hospital serve are particularly deprived with a lack of access to clean water and therefore sanitation. Many communities reside close to swamp areas or rivers. The lack of ventilation in houses and humid temperatures result in perfect mosquito breeding environments, thus promoting the spread of the disease.

# **School Feeding Programme**

The Swiss-Sierra Leone Development Foundation received a visit from the Executive Director, Co-Founder and Chairman of the Aurora Foundation, an NGO supporting cultural and social projects in both Iceland and Sierra Leone.

Subsequent to their visit, the Aurora Foundation have agreed to partner with SSLDF in the area of a feeding programme at Magbenteh Community Boarding School.



This new and exciting partnership will enable SSLDF to provide 2 nutritious meals 3 days per week, during the next 6 months. The additional 2 days of feeding will be supported by a Swiss Association (ASSEDA) and a German Association (Helfende Hände).



A specific focus on the nutritional aspect has been emphasized regard to the quality of ingredients used by our cooks, as well as ensuring vitamins, fat, calcium and protein in particular are incorporated into the diet.

This is particularly important as many of the children attending the school are malnourished, only previously eating once per day and executing domestic work both prior and after school. Each child has the responsibility of washing their bowl and cutlery prior and after eating, creating a sense of self-worth and accountability.

### Sierra Leone Elections

On March 7, 2018 the country held Presidential and General Elections. Sierra Leone has a population of 6.9 million people, with just under 3 million votes. Ballot boxes at polling stations were counted manually twice, with results sent to the National Electoral Committee in Freetown and not announced until 13th March 2018. No single party won the 55% majority required to win the Presidential Election, therefore a 'run-off' or 're-election' was declared for 27th March 2018. This has now been postponed until 31st March 2018.



The country is currently at a 'standstill' with schools and business closed, lack of imports by suppliers; the Sierra Leonean economy is suffering, severely impacting the health and education sectors especially. In a nation with continuous resilience in the face of constant challenges we pray for change, hope and most importantly peace.

# The Family Planning Clinic

After the Ebola outbreak and with the support of two private donors, the Family Planning clinic will reopen at Magbenteh Community Hospital, providing free contraception to women in Bombali District.




By re-establishing the Family Planning clinic at Magbenteh Community Hospital, our staff will be able to sensitize women about how to plan a family and take control of their lives. Our facility will serve the surrounding villages and educate not only the women but also the communities in which they reside.

By offering contraception to mothers after giving birth in our maternity ward, educating during the antenatal process, combined with the location of the clinic next to the under-fives health care room, we will be able to protect more women and give them the ability to make their own decisions and choose for themselves.


# The Quarter in numbers

#### **Hospitalisations**



Due to lack of financial resources, as the quarter progressed, the hospital was forced to admit an ever decreasing number of patients. With 100 beds over four weeks and an average stay of half a week, the monthly capacity would be 800 patients and the quarterly capacity 2'400 patients. Thus, with 574 patients in the quarter, only about 25% of the hospital's capacity was used.

#### **Ambulatory**



The ambulatory intake suffered even more from the lack of financial resources. Based on historical records, we could easily have taken ten times as many patients had we had sufficient funds available.


